









## City, Hoopeston Foods, Inc. approve settlement agreement

A lawsuit filed by Hoopeston Foods, Inc., involving two previous city officials has been settled.

The Hoopeston City Council on Tuesday unanimously approved a settlement agreement with Hoopeston Foods that ends the company's suit against former Mayor Bob Ault and then-city clerk Chalmers Flint.

The suit stemmed from a 1998 contract between Hoopeston Foods and the city. City officials denied the validity of the contract because a corresponding resolution was not found among city documents, said city water committee chairman Bill Crusinberry.

Under terms of that contract, HFI agreed to pay for its wastewater to be treated chemically at pretreatment lagoons the city purchased from the company in 1996, Crusinberry said. Officials later switched from chemical treatment to an aeration system that eliminated the odor coming from the lagoons. HFI claimed the elimination of chemical treatment meant its treatment costs should be lowered. When the city disagreed, the company filed suit.

Under terms of the settlement agreement, HFI agreed that its first 100,000 gallons of wastewater will be charged the same amount Hoopeston residents pay for treatment, \$2.58 per gallon. The amount is to be prorated so that the more wastewater is treated, the less per gallon HFI will pay.

The agreement is good for 12 years. During that time, if the base rate increases, HFI's rate will also increase. However, Crusinberry said, the rate may only go up once during the first six years of the agreement and once in the second half. After the 12 years, the rate may increase by percentage, he said.

Additionally, Hoopeston Foods agreed to pay operational costs for wastewater that goes through the pretreatment lagoons rather than a per-gallon fee. Crusinberry said that will be a help to the city if electric rates climb this year. "We're going to recapture our costs," he said.

Finally, the agreement bans both sides from filing suit again on the matter and neither side will receive any money from the settlement.

With the agreement, Hoopeston will see more income from HFI's treated wastewater. Since the 1998 agreement and subsequent cessation of chemical treatment, Crusinberry said Hoopeston Foods has been paying "what they thought was their fair share" of \$2.40 per 1,000 gallons for pretreatment and an equal amount for wastewater at the sewage treatment plant.

Crusinberry said he has been negotiating a settlement since August. "To me this is a very fair thing," he said. "It's been approved. There shouldn't be (any) snags."

In the 15 or so months since the suit was filed, the city has spend more than \$50,000 fighting the suit, including agreeing to pay attorney fees for Ault and Flint, Crusinberry said.

In unrelated business, Alderman Bill Goodwine, finance committee chairman, said Jim and Megan Collins, who received a revolving loan to open Hoops 'N Stitches embroidery business, closed the shop and have not made a payment on the loan.

In June, the couple requested \$15,000 to open the business.

Goodwine said officials need to get more firm in collecting from some revolving loan recipients. "I think sometimes patience is equated with softness," he said. While some recipients have paid off loans through bankruptcies and businesses closing, others ignore their responsibility.

In the case of the Collinses, Goodwine said the city is looking at wage garnishment as a means of getting repaid.
