HA seeks - but doesn't expect - increased 2006-07 tax levy

If the local equalized assessed valuation significantly rises, Hoopeston Area schools will be ready.

At Thursday night's regular meeting, Hoopeston Area School Board members unanimously approved a 9.07 percent increase over last year's tax levy.

The increase in the levy does not mean taxes are going up, Superintendent Mark Conolly said. In fact, while total property taxes to be levied for 2006 are \$3,090,000, Conolly expects the district will receive about what it did in 2005 - \$2,809,965. "It's the same amount we've proposed the last three years but we've never gotten it," he said.

Conolly explained that school levies are set in September while the equalized assessed valuation will not be known until spring. If the valuation goes up and the district did not request more than five percent more than

what it received last year, it would not get the additional money an increased valuation would bring.

"The chance of getting almost \$3 million in a levy is almost zero," Conolly said. "That's not going to happen. It hasn't happened since we've been doing this. We're just hedging our bets."

Most recent figures for the district EAV show it decreased from about \$65 million to just over \$60 million.

In unrelated business, the board learned the district's six-day enrollment figures are higher than last year's. A total of 1,322 students were enrolled on the sixth day of the school year, up from 1,283 last year. "It's encouraging to see those numbers up," said board president Steve Unger.

The increase bucks an ongoing trend of the district

Hoopeston Education Association shows solidarity at meeting

A sea of red flooded the high school library Thursday night during the regular Hoopeston Area School Board meeting.

Members of the Hoopeston Education Association, in red shirts promoting the local, state and federal education associations, and supporters of HEA members, showed solidarity Thursday in preparation for a meeting Monday between the union and board negotiating committees and a federal mediator.

After a budget hearing prior to the regular meeting, board president Steve Unger thanked the crowd for coming. "I will say this was the biggest turnout we've ever had for a budget hearing," he quipped.

Monday's meeting will be the second time both sides have met with a mediator. The first meeting was Aug. 22. Another meeting with the mediator may be held Wednesday if both sides to not come to an agreement Monday.

No meetings with the mediator have been scheduled past Wednesday.

Stumbling blocks include economic and contract language issues, representatives from each side have said.

Teachers say educating students is still their top priority. "For the time being, the teachers are continuing to educate the children," HEA president Suzie Root said at the meeting.

Whether teachers will go on strike remains to be seen. Union leaders have not called for a strike vote. To go on strike, a majority of HEA members must vote to strike and 10 days notice must be given before a strike could

Teachers have been working without a contract since the start of school, as they did last year when a contract was not approved until September.

losing students. In the past 12 years, Hoopeston Area has lost 401 students. In 2003-04, attendance was up 10 over 2002-03 but in 2005-06, district numbers were down by 60

Numbers do not include 40 CARE students and 37 attending from the former Rossville-Alvin High School.

The increase means more state aid for the district, which receives roughly \$3,000 pre student in state funding.

In other business, the board:

• Approved the 2007 budget with projected revenue of \$10,438,000 and expenses of \$10,475,000, leaving a negative balance of \$37,000. Each year, the board devises a "worst-case scenario budget," hoping they will end the year better than projected. In 2005-06, the district had actual revenue of \$10,358,000 and actual expenses of \$9.956,000.



- Approved paying \$2,100 to Rossville-Alvin school district for the cost of utilities for holding ag classes at the former RA High School. Bismarck-Henning will pay an equal share, Conolly said.
- The districts signed a two-year agreement to hold the program at Rossville. This is the second year of the agreement.
- Approved resignations of Mitch Pruemer as seventh grade boys basketball coach and Josh Haley, eighth grade boys basketball coach.
- Learned the district still does not know the results of standardized tests measuring annual yearly progress or the Prairie State Assessment Exam.

Conolly said he has no idea when results will be available

• Learned the district will have to hold a hearing on juniors and seniors requested PE waivers to take college-prep courses.

The state is cracking down on such waivers, Conolly said.
