Young people discuss concerns at Youth Council town hall

Hoopeston youth have the same concerns as adults: the local economy, lack of jobs and few activities.

On top of those issues, they also worry about drugs, alcohol, peer pressure, stress and racism.

Those issues surfaced during a poll of 300 Hoopeston Area High School students, conducted recently by members of the newly-formed Mayor's Youth Council.

Youth council members will work with city officials on issues facing Hoopeston, as well as the needs of young people.

The council met with citizens Monday night at a town hall meeting to talk about the survey results and get input from residents.

Other concerns rated by students include not enough opportunities, boredom, poor parenting, school issues and the need for stronger authority figures.

On the plus side, 86 percent of those surveyed said they are supported by their parents. Other support comes from friends (76 percent), teachers (42 percent) and (64 percent).

Only six percent of students said they receive support from a religious source, a cause of concern to some reli-See YOUTH on other side

Hoopeston Area teachers, board to meet again Wednesday

Negotiating teams for Hoopeston Area teachers and the school board will meet with a federal mediator Wednesday night.

The two sides failed to reach an agreement on a new teachers' contract after five hours of negotiating Monday night.

Members of the Hoopeston Education Association bargaining committee made a counterproposal during the Aug. 22 session, said committee member John Brown. Monday night, the board made a counterproposal which was delivered to the teachers at about 8:30.

The union committee was preparing a list of counterproposals when, at 9:20, they were told the board's negotiating committee had to adjourn. Brown said the teachers' committee stayed until about 10 p.m. finishing up their counterproposal, which is expected to be presented first thing when both sides meet with the mediator at 5 p.m. Wednesday.

"There was some movement in the board's proposals, so we are prepared to stay as long as needed to get a settlement on Wednesday," Brown said.

The sides have met about 10 times since April.
