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Council approves hikes in cemetery rates, perpetual care

The cost of getting buried is going up.

The Hoopeston City Council unanimously approved a rate increase in labor charges for Floral Hill Cemetery at Tuesday night's regular meeting.

This is the second increase in as many years.

Under the new rate system, fees for opening adult graves will go from \$250 on weekdays to \$300. Rates for opening graves for ashes and babies will go from \$100 to \$150. Saturday rates will go from \$125 for urns and baby graves to \$225 and for adult graves, from \$3256 to \$450.

In the event of a Sunday or holiday grave opening, the rate is \$750 for adult graves and \$375 for ashes and baby graves.

Grave openings are done on Sundays and holidays only in emergency situations and with cemetery committee approval.

Seeding of graves, which had a \$20 charge, will now be included in grave opening fees. The charge for sod-

Local polling places experience problems on election day

Hoopeston voters faced a few problems during Tuesday's election.

Those who planned to cast ballots bright and early

in Grant 2 were turned away because the polling place was short a Democrat election judge.

One of those who was told to return was Hoopeston Area School Board candidate Joel Bird, who tried to vote shortly after 6 a.m.

Bird said he was told to return around 10 a.m. but went back shortly after 8 a.m. and was able to vote.

Vermilion County Clerk Lynn Foster said a judge from another precinct was brought in to the polling place.

In Grant 1, some city voters were given ballots that did not candidate Nancy Stipp.

The polling place includes voters in both Hoopeston city proper and rural residents.

ding graves remained at \$50.

Alderwoman Gail Lane, head of the city cemetery committee, said Floral Hill rates had been far lower than rates at other cemeteries. The new fees are more in line with what others charge. She said she does not think the committee will ask for increased rates next year.

Fees for perpetual care at the cemetery were also increased, from \$1,000 to \$1,500.

The new rates will become effective May 1.

In other business, Ed Hubbard, chairman of Witch School, announced the school has been sold and will be out of Hoopeston by May 1.

Hubbard did not disclose details on the sale, saying only that he received "a considerable amount of money" for it. He did not respond to email and telephone requests for further information.

Hubbard told the council that the jobs Witchschool created will also go with it. He talked of the mural on the front of the building the school has rented. Done by Phil Lacey, Hubbard said the mural had received coverage in news media in Los Angeles, New York and London and that a plan for Lacey to do another mural on the side of the building has been scrapped. More than 400 stories had been generated by WitchSchool's existence in Hoopeston, he added.

Additionally, Hoopeston will lose sales tax revenue paid by WitchSchool, payroll taxes and money that is put back into the community through employees purchasing items in the city.

Hubbard reminded the council of when he first came to Hoopeston, when a group of citizens presented a petition to the city asking that WitchSchool not open in Hoopeston. "If I had listened to that petition, my health would be better," he said.

Hubbard said he recently had a heart attack scare which turned out to be a pinched nerve.

Hubbard stressed that Illiana Web is not a Wiccan company. "I've resigned from everything," he said. "I'm tired of the prayer circles at my house. I'm tired of being told every day that I shouldn't be here." Some of the people who tell him that are "very influential," he said.

Hubbard then asked the council whether they wanted Illiana Web to stay in Hoopeston. The company, an internet service provider, is online, offering technology "among the most advanced in the world," he said.

In response to the question, Mayor Bill DeWitt said, "We reside in America. It's the land of the free and the home of the brave. If you want to stay here and try to be successful, ok. If you want to move down the road, good luck to you."

City attorney Paul Manion wondered why Hubbard was seeking council approval. "I was in business for 40 years," he said. "A lot of people loved me, a lot of people hate me. I didn't get council approval. I didn't care if they liked me. I didn't care what they thought."

DeWitt echoed a similar thought. "If I was in business in a community and I thought I had to have a public opinion poll, by hell, I would move," he said.
