



If city attorney Paul Manion were a movie reviewer,

he would not give thumbs up to a start-up company that plans to purchase Charter Cable.

At Tuesday night's Hoopeston City Council meeting, Manion said he talked with a representative of Avenue Broadband Communications, which plans to purchase Charter properties. He called the conversation "not terri-

Avenue, he said, is a shell corporation and he was not told the name of the parent corporation but that that company is comprised of a group of independent investors with \$16-\$18 million to invest in Avenue. Company officials declined to release financial information, other than issuing a pro forma statement, and wondered why Hoopeston requested so much information when other communities in the Charter group had not.

Manion told the council he had reservations about documentation Avenue wants city officials to sign because tenets of a 2002 contract between Hoopeston and Charter were not included and because Avenue documents did not include a limit on what customers could be charged, although the company representative later

the 2002 agreement with Charter, any successor must be approved by the council unless there is a "reasonable" reason not to. Failure to provide financial information may be reasonable, he said, but not approving the sale might cause unnecessary hard feelings, he said.

According to Manion, Avenue said that within 12 months of closing, it will provide high speed internet access, high definition TV and local and long distance phone capability.

Under the proposed contract, there is little penalty if Avenue fails to meet its end of the deal. The city could revoke the deal but that would leave cable customers searching for another provider of television service.

The council anticipates that an Avenue representative will attend at its Oct. 16 meeting to answer questions.

In unrelated action, Alderman Jerry Yonkers failed to get a second on his motion to purchase a new street sweeper.

Yonkers said the current 12-year-old model has had nearly \$37,000 in repairs since last October and needs another \$5,000 to \$10,000 to fix two leaking pumps, including one for hydraulic fluid.

Key Equipment & Supply, the company that repairs the city sweeper, said it could take six weeks for repairs, essentially ending street sweeping season in Hoopeston. Key agreed to sell a demonstration model Elgin Street Sweeper for \$123,495, including \$16,500 trade-in on the

current model. Most of the money is in the street and alley department accrual fund, but Yonkers said he would have to have an inter-city loan to cover about \$23,000.

Alderman Bill Goodwine said it would be better financially to continue to pay to have the existing one fixed. "The companies I've worked for always demanded a four-year payback, sometimes three," he said. "It wouldn't bother me a bit to spend \$5,000-\$10,000 a year, even \$20,000-\$25,000."

Yonkers reiterated that money would come from the accrual fund, "and that's what accrual is for," but Goodwine responded that using the fund would leave no money available for emergencies.

Even pleas that not sweeping the streets would harm the sewer system did not help. Goodwine suggested Yonkers rent or borrow one from Key while the city machine is being fixed and Alderman Brandon Hamilton suggested contacting a Danville company that works on hydraulics.

In other business, the civic committee will be looking at ordinances pertaining to rummage sales and trying to strengthen them.

Alderwoman Nancy Stipp said she planned to collect a stack of sale signs from utility poles in the city and dump them on the council floor but when she went around Hoopeston, only found one outdated sign. "Somebody must have beaten me to it," she said. Rummage sale signs may be no bigger than four square feet and may only be posted for five days.
