

Representative explains high school credit recovery program

In an effort to keep students from dropping out, Hoopeston Area High School Principal Larry Maynard is recommending an online program that will allow students to earn credits they may be lacking.

At Thursday night's Hoopeston Area School Board meeting, Maynard introduced Kelly Clark, representative for EdOptions, a Virginia-based company that provides online courses often used for summer school.

Clark outlined EdOptions' program, which offers summer and year-round online course options to school districts. Students are able to work at their own pace and may work from computers anywhere, including at home.

The program will be offered to students this summer. Unlike previous years, this year, students will have summer school online and will be able to take up to two courses, Maynard said.

Cost for participation is \$100 per student, which includes the \$50-per-student cost of the program plus the cost of a teacher to monitor the classroom, he said.

The Regional Office of Education has approved a grant for the program, but it is a reimbursement grant, which will pay after the cost of the program has already been paid. The grant will not cover the salary of the



teacher, Maynard said.

No more than 20 students may participate in the program this summer, but Maynard hopes EdOptions can become a permanent part of the high school, allowing students to work before or after school to recover lost credits.

Clark said school districts use EdOptions both for credit recovery and also as a way to get students up to speed, helping districts meet Annual Yearly Progress statistics mandated in the federal No Child Left Behind act. The program curriculum is developed by teachers and correlated with state standards.

The company also has programs for adult learners and home-schooling, Clark said.

In related business, Maynard told the board that a practice session Thursday for this week's Prairie State Achievement test went well.

Juniors will take the test Wednesday and Thursday. The class will be divided between St. Anthony Parish Hall and the Methodist church for their testing. About 80 students will be taking the test, whose scores determine whether the school meets requirements under No Child Left Behind.
