Grant-Butler Multi Township Assessment District functioning

The foundation for a new multi-township assessing district was laid Friday at the district's first board meeting.

Grant and Butler townships recently formed a multi-township assessing district at the request of Butler officials, who said their current assessor will not seek re-election and that the township population likely has dropped below 1,000 residents needed for a township to have an assessor.

Butler Superintendent Dave Anderson was named chairman of the new board. Wayne King, who serves as Butler clerk, was named treasurer and Grant clerk Sharon Johnson was named clerk for the new board.

The board, which also includes Grant Supervisor Bill Boose, chose Grant-Butler Multi Township Assessment District as the legal name for the entity.

After selecting officers and a name, the board wrangled with a salary for the new district's assessor. That person will be elected in April 2009 and take office in January 2010.

Under a four-year salary schedule approved earlier this month, Grant's assessor, Susie Sheppard, will start at \$32,350 and end the four-year term at \$34,000.

Butler Township currently pays \$4,850 for each of the four years but King said Butler officials expected to have to pay more to have get and keep a competent person. "We need to try to make the job as attractive as we can afford," he said.

Sheppard, who is expected to be the multi-township assessor because she is the only one who currently meets the qualifications for the job, suggested that since Butler has about one-third the parcels of Grant, her salary go up by a like amount - \$10,000. Sheppard said she discussed the matter with Don Crist, Vermillion County Supervisor of Assessments. "He said he wouldn't do it for less than \$10,000," she said.

In a 3-1 vote, the board approved a starting salary of \$40,000 per year with \$1,000 raises for years two through four.

Boose was the sole no vote, saying before the vote that the assessor would not necessarily be doing one-third more work. "I'm not opposed to the increase but I have a little bit of trouble with that much," he said.

Sheppard pointed out that the assessor is the only township official who must take and pass classes to qualify to be elected. She said her duties include more than assessing property, including dealing with freezes, exemptions and dealing with property owner complaints about their assessments and resulting taxes.

King agreed that dealing with complaints can be difficult. "Frankly, I wouldn't sit and listen to some of the guff she takes," he said. "It's excessive."

Still to be decided is how often the board will meet and board members' compensation. Also, a budget for the new district must be created.

The board will reconvene at 3 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 7 at the Grant Township office, 525 S. Market, to address some of those issues.
