Only a handful of people attended a community meeting designed to provide public input into a long-range plan for Hoopeston Area schools, but those there offered many comments, both positive and negative. Dave Kietzmann, vice presi-

dent of instruction at Danville Area Community College, moderated the meeting and will report suggestions to the board

The group was equally forthcoming when Kietzmann asked what the district could do better.

The father of students currently attending Hoopeston Area schools said he felt "to a certain extent that we're rearranging deck chairs on the Titanic," citing pregnancies of middle school students, violence and drugs as problems. He admitted the problems "are not exclusive to Hoopeston by any means. It's a cultural thing." However, "I pick my daughter up from school. It's terrifying," he said.

The man said he and his wife are considering homeschooling "but we hate to leave our teachers."

The mother of former students said the district needs to offer more college preparatory classes, saying many classes seem geared to non-college-bound and struggling students.

Others thought more classes dealing with real life situations should be offered and perhaps mandated, such as home economics, child care and classes dealing with finances, such as budgeting and handling a checkbook.

Other suggestions for areas in which the district is lacking include:

• Some students not participating in any extra-curricular activities and the need for teachers and parents to en-

At the end of the meeting, Kietzmann asked those attending to make checkmarks under the list of what could be improved and will submit those numbers to the board.

"Obviously, the school board can't focus on all of them," he said, asking each person to check the five areas most important to him or her.

"I think we will see a lot of these challenges in the strategic plan," Kietzmann said, adding several mentioned by community members had also been brought up by administrators and staff.
