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IEPA sets aside loan funds to repair city water storage tanks

The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has set aside \$1.25 million in loan money to fix Hoopeston's water storage tanks.

In a letter to the city, the IEPA said funds would be available as long as the city maintains a loan application completion schedule, said Alderman Bill Crusinberry at Tuesday's Hoopeston City Council meeting.

Crusinberry, chairman of the water/sewer department, said application materials must be ready by January 1, 2009. If the deadline is met, a construction contract would be awarded by March 31, 2009.

Foth, Inc., a Champaign engineering firm, is completing the application on behalf of the city.

Money would be used to repair both the water tower and "very serious problems" with the ground storage tank, Crusinberry said.

The interior of the ground tank would be rebuilt, both tanks would receive other repairs, sandblasting and repainting and a third tank would be constructed that would include a new aerator. Crusinberry said maintenance on the third tank would be easier because it could most likely be cleaned with a fire hose.

When work is completed, it should last for about 30 years.

The city will have to determine how to repay the low-interest loan, which may include increasing water rates by \$2 or \$2.50 per household and a similar increase for commercial customers, Crusinberry said, adding the water department has to be self-supporting and cannot take money from the city's general fund.

In unrelated business, the council took no action on an agenda item to award bids for an engineered barrier at the site of the proposed motel.

The barrier, expected to be made of asphalt, is the final stage the city must have done before the EPA will issue a No Further Remediation (NFR) letter on

the property. A conditional NFR could be issued before the work is complete, allowing development to begin.

Alderman Bill Goodwine, finance committee chairman, told the council that there is still a lot of work to do before the barrier is put down and before a sewer line on the property is relocated.

Mayor Bill DeWitt asked if the city shouldn't move ahead quickly but Goodwine said the city is not sure where exactly the barrier is to be located and that ground will not be broken for the motel until spring. "It's not an emergency, by any means," Goodwine said.

In unrelated business, Alderman Ed Lotz, police committee chairman, said a proposed ordinance allowing golf carts to be driven on city streets is "still in limbo," but since carts would only be allowed on streets between March and the end of September, "we have plenty of time to put it together."

The city still needs to get a state permit that would designate where carts could cross Routes 1 and 9.

Goodwine wondered whether the ordinance needs to be enacted, since the price of gasoline has dropped from \$4/gallon to \$1.83/gallon.

Lotz responded that several residents continue to show interest in the proposal.

In final business, resident Jean Minick told the council that Santa will arrive on November 29 and will meet youngsters at the Methodist Church. The day will also feature an all-you-can-eat pancake breakfast from 6 a.m. to 1 p.m. and pictures with Santa. Cost for the breakfast is \$5 per person, with children under five eating free. Pictures with Santa will be \$3 each.
