Million dollar investment planned by Silgan Containers

Silgan Containers is planning a \$1 million upgrade that will add four to six jobs to the company's payroll.

Mayor Bill Crusinberry said at Tuesday night's Hoopeston City Council meeting that a new shearing machine will be installed to cut large rolls of metal, rather than precut sheets.

Two people are needed to run the shearer, which will mean two additional employees on first and second shifts, with the possibility of two for the third shift, he said.

Crusinberry said plant manager Jeff Miller told him that to accommodate the machine, a new floor must first be installed and that Silgan may build a new loading dock on the backside of it's property. If the dock is built, about 60 percent of semi traffic on Main Street would be moved to the back of the factory.

If Silgan builds the dock, it will need one quarter to one third acre of the former railroad right-of-way currently owned by the city, Crusinberry said.

The investment shows the local plant will remain in Hoopeston, Crusinberry said. "A business spending \$1 million isn't going to be pulled out of Hoopeston," he said, adding Silgan is the second business to make such a large investment in Hoopeston.

Crusinberry recently announced Hoopeston Foods is upgrading equipment at a cost of about \$1 million.

In unrelated business, the council:

- Heard from Scott Strawser, Emergency Management director, that a new emergency siren was purchased for \$27,248 from Braniff Communications of Crestwood. The cost includes installation. The new siren will be placed on West Elm near McFerren Park.
- Approved transferring the Willdon Building to Tad Ballantyne, CEO of Hoopeston Foods. In return for the building, Ballantyne must construct an apartment costing not less than \$60,000, in an upper floor of the building and must agree to not remove marble from the building. If Ballantyne does not have the apartment done by December 15, the building could revert back to the city.
- Heard from Alderman Jeff Johnson, who set a street and alley committee meeting for 6:30 p.m. July 14 to review the resurfacing project and address some high point maintenance items. He requested water/sewer also
- Heard from economic developer Dana Goodrum that the city will conduct an income survey to be used for a design and construction grant application for infrastruc-
