



## HRHC announces remodeling plan, signs Carle agreement

A \$4.6 million remodeling plan and an agreement with Carle Foundation Hospital were announced at a Hoopeston Regional Health Center celebration Sunday. The affiliation agreement with Carle will provide expanded services at Hoopeston Community Memorial Hospital, said Harry Brockus, CEO of HRHC. Among those are Carle therapy services offered locally, shared radiology readings and general surgeons from Carle who will have office

tion Hospital, said James C. Leonard, MD., CEO of Carle Foundation. While Carle partners with other hospitals, it is not as extensively as it will be with Hoopeston. he said. Hopefully, over the next five years, the agreement can be used as a template with other rural hospitals, he said.

The bedrock of the agreement is quality patient care, Leonard told those at the celebration. Meeting with Brockus, Leonard said he listened, and what Brockus





mental belief that finances follow the practice of quality medicine," Leonard said. Quality healthcare, along with a good educational system and support of agriculture and the business base, help keep a community vibrant, he said. "This isn't 1980, this isn't 1990. We realize the importance of having vibrant healthcare delivery system in the rural area."

Brockus said not everything Hoopeston puts on the table will benefit Carle but Carle officials are willing to move forward with the project. On the flip side, Carle will, at times, say no to Hoopeston, Leonard said, adding "you will say no to us."

HRHC board president Russ Leigh said the agreement marks a turning point in how local hospital officials look at Carle. "Twenty years ago, they were looked at as almost the enemy," he said. The thinking then was "they were going to come gobble you up." Now, officials are happy about the partnership. "T'm excited about what's going on," Leigh said.

Brockus also announced the reconstruction project, slated for next year, will focus on the emergency room, constructing private rooms; the surgery suite; and \$1.7 million for new equipment.

The health center will apply for a low interest USDA loan or HUD funds, Brockus said.

Brockus also outlined other positive things HRHC has experienced in the last year, including:

• Employment up five percent and reduced operating expenses

• Community involvement, including the Independence Day celebration, Rossville sesquicentennial and free children's movies. "I firmly believe joy, laughter and love are important to a healthy community," he said.

• The August addition of Bridgeway, a self-referral pro-

gram for senior citizens experiencing depression. The program draws clients from not only Hoopeston and the surrounding area.

• Walk-in patients being seen at Charlotte Russell Medical Center.

• A five-year agreement with Hoopeston Emergency Medical Specialists, LTD, and physicians' assistants.

"Last January, I referred to Hoopeston Regional Health Center as a diamond in the rough," Brockus said. "After months of planning and hard work, it's starting to shine."
