## Illinois legislature approves 66 percent tax hike by 1 vote

While Illinois residents slept early Wednesday, the Senate voted to raise the personal income tax rate by

The vote came at about 1 a.m. Wednesday, when the Senate approved the tax hike 30-29. The Illinois House approved the measure Tuesday night by a 60-57 vote. The measure goes to Gov. Pat Quinn's desk for his

signature, but according to published reports. Quinn was in attendance for the Senate vote. Quinn campaigned on increasing taxes and is expected to sign the measure.

State Sen. Shane Cultra (R-Onarga) voted against Senate Bill 2505 to increase the Illinois income tax rates. "Illinoisans have lost out with this massive tax in-



crease," he said in a statement released Wednesday morning. "Our state will continue to export jobs to Indiana and other surrounding states. Illinoisans will directly feel the 67 percent tax increase and also feel the 45 percent tax increase that will be levied on business."

Cultra added that passage of the tax hike means Illinois will have the third highest tax rate in the nation. Cultra said other major components of the tax hike plan include:

•46 percent increase employers;

•Guaranteed 10 percent increase in governmental expenditures in Fiscal Year 2012;

•Guaranteed 17 percent increase in governmental spending over the next four fiscal years;

•Reinstated death tax:

Raising taxes on businesses that suffer losses.

According to published reports, lawmakers intend to make spending cuts part of the plan but specific cuts have not been announced.

Officials, including Quinn, have stated increased taxes are necessary to help balance the state's budget, which is approximately \$15 billion in the red.

What wind turbine companies don't tell you can hurt you! Lower taxes? Doubled electric bills! You do the math. Contact your local county board member and ask them about the following (and not what the companies say, but what is in their site plan with the county):

Have they talked to people in areas where wind farms have been installed?

Who is responsible for tearing down the turbines if the company goes bankrupt or is nonresponsive to calls?

Ultimately, the county.

Does the energy reduced pay for itself with no government subsidies: No

Do turbines create obstacles to TV reception, telecommunications, broadband and digital radio? Yes Can the company put a lien on the signer's property? Yes.

How have property values (market values, not assessments) been affected? Depressed if able to sell at all.

Did the counties always get the amount of proposed taxes? No, some have had to go to court and settle for less than the original amount.

the state's tax hike, decrying the lack of public hearings and unwillingness on the part of officials to answer questions about the biggest tax hike in state history.

The tax increase is supposed to be a temporary one, ending in four years.

Lawmakers did not approve a proposed \$1 per pack hike in cigarette taxes, which was earmarked to provide money for schools. Also blocked was a proposed plan to borrow \$8.7 billion to pay overdue bills.
