ported at 8:20 a.m. Sunday in the 400 block of West Thompson. An unknown vehicle left the road, hit a utility box, then left the scene.



Left out are student athletes who entertain and put on the show, who must, before they play their first game, sign a waiver that they cannot accept any proceeds from any of the earnings generated by their play, even years after they leave the school. Video games have been made using some of their images and they cannot receive any revenue from the profits of these games.

ceive any benefit from any proceeds that they have helped these schools to accrue.

Somewhere between \$700-800 million are earned each year by these people, without a dime going to the athlete. In fact, if any money is given these athletes, they will be in violation of NCAA rules and thrown out of sports.

While this is going on, the NCAA president earns about \$1,500,000. The present one earned about \$750,000,00 as a collegiate administrator before becoming the head of the NCAA...

Only about 50% of the student athletes graduate, and only 01% of these athletes in football and basketball make it to the professional ranks world wide. What are these 50% going to do for employment without a degree and without any hope of becoming professionals?
