Hoopeston Area School District's finances passed a surplus from last year to this year, according to information presented at Thursday evening's school board meeting.

Only one of the district's nine funds showed a decrease for the year. The IMRF/Social Security fund had a year-to-date decrease of \$63,344.70, but still started the new year with more than \$949,000.

The education fund, used to pay most aspects of educating students, currently has nearly \$5 million, while the building fund has approximately \$650,000.

Other funds and their current balances are: bond and

interest, \$4,084; transportation, \$147,886; site and construction, \$0; working cash \$1,571,000; tort, \$197,844; and capital improvement, \$130,737.

Superintendent Hank Hornbeck credited the good balances to working with a "worst case scenario" budget, including low incomes and high expenses. Last year, he said, the district held the line on costs while revenue was higher than budgeted.

In related financial business, the board approved Hornbeck to prepare a tentative budget for the new year and approved using working cash fund money in the See FINANCES on other side



event of an emergency.

In other business, the board heard from Class of 2011 president Jacy Samet about money remaining in the class' account. Samet told the board class officers had been told they could keep the money on account for a future class reunion, but then were told the money would roll over into the class of 2012's account to pay for their senior activities.

Board president Russ Walder said he will talk with principal Larry Maynard about her request.

The board also heard a presentation from John Greer Principal Dan Walder that the summer migrant program has 55 students enrolled and 44 who have attended at least one day, down to 2008 levels. Last year, 78 were enrolled and 57 attended at least one day. The six-year high was in 2007, when 97 were enrolled and 74 attended at least one day.

The program is open to migrant students from birth to 22, he said. This year, more students are attending from Watseka and Ambia, with 17 and 11, respectively, than the local area.

The summer program costs about \$90,000, while the 55-day fall migrant program, approved by the board Thursday, costs about \$29,000, Walder said.
