State Sen. Shane Cultra, Rep. Jason Barickman opposed to Quinn plan to close Dwight; other facilities also set to be cut

In a preview of Wednesday's budget address, Gov. Pat Quinn's office announced the planned closings of the Dwight Correctional Center, along with other mental health and prison facilities.

Both state Sen. Shane Cultra and state Rep. Jason Barickman were quick to oppose the closing.

"I said earlier this month that Governor Quinn has declared war on common sense," Cultra said. "He is exactly like Rod Blagojevich with his constant threat



of prison closures. They have tried to close Pontiac twice and now they want Dwight, shame on them. Do they not think they are absolutely crippling the economy of Livingston County," Cultra said. "Governor Quinn needs to rest assured of one thing, we are in this fight for the long-haul and that's exactly what this is - a fight over families' lives, local economies and our state's public safety."

Barickman said, "This is the typical pattern we have come to expect from this Governor. He doesn't back up his ideas with facts or long-term plans, instead offering an unrealistic plan of closing prisons at a time when those facilities are already overcrowded.

"Unfortunately, this is more of the same. After years of mismanagement of our state's finances, he is turning to short-sighted facility closures without actually addressing the core problems facing the state budget. I'm disappointed in the Governor's plan."
