### One percent sales tax hike to be put to voters in November

Hoopeston voters will decide in November whether to add one percent to the sales tax.

Hoopeston City Council voted 7-0 Tuesday night to put the tax increase to the voters to fund various projects in the city, including infrastructure improvements, new roads and repair of existing ones at Floral Hill and demolishing dilapidated residential and commercial property.

In introducing the issue, Alderman Randy Carter said most small communities have the same issue of abandoned property. Officials, he said, "can sit back and dwell on the problem or develop an innovative program to fix it."

Carter said officials dismissed increasing the property tax to gain extra money "We don't want to add more burden to property tax payers," he said.

A sales tax increase will generate additional revenue not only from residents, but also out-of-town shoppers, who purchase the two items that currently generate the most sales tax: gasoline and automobiles.

If approved the tax would add \$1 to a \$100 purchase and will be charged on all goods and services that are currently taxed.

To entice residents to vote for it, the council earmarked

\$25,000 to tear down two properties in the city, in the hope that residents would see the difference demolition makes and be willing to pay for more. Calling the earmark a "teaser campaign," Carter said two have been selected "but if you drive around Hoopeston, there are 100 more just like them."

While all aldermen present voted to put the issue to voters, one said his yes vote was not an endorsement of the tax increase.

"I have no objection to putting it to the voters of Hoopeston," he said, "but in no way would I want them
