the city to take care of these problems. The present city council has been active in trying to resolve these issues, but after so many years of neglect, the task of remediation grows larger every day. Some strides have been made with the water tower and filtration system and we have seen gradual improvement in the city streets. Due to the work of the housing committee from the Hoopeston Community Alliance, you will soon see some action on dilapidated properties.

I believe this city council has the will to move forward, but it has to have the funds to be able to do so. There are limited funds available each year from the budget to make small improvements. The problem is that the needs far outpace the available funds. We are simply getting farther and farther behind each year.

New sources of funding need to be found. Property owners are already overburdened with property taxes. A source could be funding through sales tax. This would be a more equitable source as it spreads the burden over all citizens instead of just property owners. The impact per purchase is very minimal. A one percent increase on a \$50 purchase would be just 50 cents. The increase would not be applied to grocery food products and prescription drugs. Even with the increase, Hoopeston's rate would still be well under the Danville and Champaign area rates.

If we as citizens want to see our city stabilized and improved, then we need to consider supporting a sales tax increase of one percent. I do not like taxes period, but I also do not like seeing our city continue to crumble around us. Something has to give.

Mayor writes in favor of tax hike

On the November ballot, there will be a question as to whether the Hoopeston should assess an additional one percent on the sales tax added to the cost of purchased items. I am sure many of you wonder why the city needs this additional revenue and what will it be used for. Hopefully, this will clarify some of the questions you might have.

First, Hoopeston is financially sound, which has been achieved by annually maintaining a balanced budget. One of the largest challenges we faced was when the 2010 census showed the city losing approximately 600 residents.

A direct result of this is that all municipalities share a percentage of state income tax, based on their populations. This loss reduced the city's share by approximately \$60,000 a year. Of course, city expenses continued at the same rate.

The loss of revenue had to be made up somewhere. Unfortunately this was accomplished by making many hard choices. One of the hardest was implemented nearly three years ago, when the council initiated a reduction of workforce by eliminating a position in nearly all of the city's departments. We also cut back on funds allocated to our accrual accounts, used purchase equipment such as backhoes, dump trucks, and police squad cars.

These practices, along with not doing some projects we would like to have done, has kept the city in sound financial shape, but we cannot keep putting off forever, things that need to be done.

Of the things that need to be addressed, first is the number of vacant houses in Hoopeston that are not habitable in their present condition. We are currently looking at a remediation program and have identified 10 of the worst, but that list could easily be expanded to 25 or more.

Next we have abandoned commercial properties in various stages of decay. The list would include Vermilion Iron, Essex Wire, Hoopeston Fertilizer, the Moose Club, and several smaller commercial buildings in the downtown area. If we as a city do not address these deteriorating properties, we will be witness as their condition con-

tinues to worsen.

There are other areas that we would like to see improvements, if the revenue could be obtained.

Our water system was originally constructed during the late 1800s and we have two primary water mains still in use from that time. The main from the water treatment plant to the CSX tracks on Main St and the one on Market St. from the post office north to the fire station were both constructed in 1888. Numerous shutoff valves in our system do not close

completely due to age.

The roads in McFerren Park and Floral Hill both need attention. Sidewalks and tennis courts in our parks have not seen the necessary repairs made for many years. Without additional revenue, these items will easily be put aside during the budget process.

I have laid out a very aggressive agenda as to some of the things we would like to do, but this agenda does not come without a price tag. We know that we can not tackle all or even some of these items without raising the revenue needed.

A first suggestion was to look at an increase on property taxes, but we felt this would put an additional burden on homeowners and subsequently renters, so we looked for another source. We decided to approach this with an increase in sales tax, since

many of the people purchasing in Hoopeston reside outside the city limits and it will spread the tax raised over a much larger group of people.

It should be noted that two items will be exempt from this increase: food you buy and take home to prepare yourself and all prescription medicine.

This tax, if passed, the effect would be if you went to a restaurant and spent \$25 it would cost an additional 25cents, (one quarter) or on a larger purchase of \$50 an additional 50c cents, (two quarters).

In closing I would urge you, if you would like to see Hoopeston progressively move forward and become an even better place to live and raise a family, on November 4 vote yes on the sales tax question, and ask your family, friends, and neighbors to do the same.

The future of Hoopeston will be impacted by your vote.
