

That energy will come in handy in completing plans she has as new director of Hoopeston Public Library. Freeland was named director on

October 1, taking over from Linda Mitchell, who retired.

Saying she doesn't want to make major changes until "I get my feet wet," Freeland said one thing she hopes to do is get local youth in and more involved. "It's a safe place for kids here," she said. As time and money allows, she

would like to redo the youth reading area, replacing the neutraltoned walls and staid furniture with more vibrant shades and softer

places for youth to curl up to read and visit with friends.

She would like to see increased volunteerism by young people at plans to look into the possibility of the library being a D.O. site.

She would also like to expand the genres of available books, both for adults and youngsters, encouraging kids' reading through such things as graphic novels.

And Freeland is open to suggestions from patrons as to what is available, such as new books, video games, movies and more. "Come see me," she said. "I'll get what you want."

As new things are added, the library will continue

its book sales to allow residents to purchase bags of books. "You can't have new books coming in and not think 'where are you going to put them," Freeland said, saying the library's 17-person staff tries to keep on top of which items are popular and which haven't been checked out in a while.

In fact, a Black Friday sale will begin November 28 in the lower level board room during regular library hours.

Freeland's fall hiring was done purposely, allowing Mitchell to do the new year's budget and final reports, buying time for Freeland to learn the ropes before having to do those chores. "That was very nice," Freeland said. "I really appreciate that," adding that Mitchell's prede-

cessor, Lou Graham, did the same for Mitchell.

Along with learning budgeting and reports, Freeland is also learning about grants and how to apply for those that could help the library, which is funded through grants, donations and property taxes.

Freeland is not the stereotypical librarian. There is no bun for her hair, which is long and loose, and often falls in her face as she gestures animatedly.

She seems not to be a big "shhh"-er, either, as her deep, throaty laugh can often be heard on the library's main floor.


Freeland said she has few rules, but those she has will be enforced. A big one is that actions have con-
