Rep. Bennett spends Monday with Hoopeston youth, voters

They were small in number but a group of area residents shared what they consider big problems in the state at a town hall meeting Monday evening.

State Rep. Tom Bennett (R-Gibson City), representing the 106th District, spent most of Monday in Hoopeston, visiting government classes at Hoopeston Area High School and lunching with civic leaders before meeting with a handful of citizens at Hoopeston City Hall.

Bennett started out by talking about the 106th District, which, he said, has 108,000 people living in it. He transitioned to the state of the state, saying that 12 years of one-party leadership has left Illinois with a \$6 billion deficit. The hike in the income tax rate passed under former Gov. Pat Quinn, which was supposed to remedy the deficit, instead was used for new programs, pension payments and...well...leaders aren't sure what. "Even today, we're not sure where it all went," Bennett said.

New Gov. Bruce Rauner got a thumbs up from Bennett, who praised his business perspective, which, he hopes, will help solve Illinois' problems and entice business growth in the state, and for his willingness to tackle tough issues. "You've got to applaud (Rauner) for trying to fix things," he said.

The state spends \$1 billion every 11 plus days, Bennett said. To bring that number into perspective for government students, they learned that 1 billion seconds ago was 31.7 years ago, or 1983, long before the students were born.

Along with too much spending, Illinois faces other problems. One is people fleeing the state. Last year, he said, more people moved out of Illinois than were born in the state.

Businesses, too, are moving - or closing their doors due to the cost of doing business here.

Bennett is hopeful that Illinois can be righted. Changes

may encourage more business growth, which will, in turn, provide more tax dollars to spend on schools, roads and state programs.

Gary Weinard, former Vermilion County Board chairman, outlined some issues facing the area, including the need for equitable school funding in the face of decreased assessed valuation; the need for state regulation for wind farms, especially allowable noise, that would apply to counties, like Vermilion, that don't have county-wide zoning laws; and truth from politicians; truth from politicians, unlike Speaker Michael Madigan's projected revenue for budgets that "didn't matter if it was achieved or achievable."

Russell Burge, a veteran and 40-year employee at now-Silgan Containers, told Bennett that his veterans identification card is not accepted at many places because it does not have his photo. Also, although he served for four years in the military, Burge said he worked and "made too much money" to qualify for VA care.

Those concerns were referred to a representative of U.S. Rep. John Shimkus, who attended the meeting.

Burge also questioned Illinois gun laws, especially concealed carry and the need for a Firearms Owner ID card. "I fought for that Second Amendment," he said. He compared Illinois, where a FOID card is required to purchase ammunition, with Indiana where "you can buy it over the counter, like a Snickers bar."

Bennett said he understood Burge's frustration with that issue, saying one of the first things he did was introduce legislation to get rid of the Illinois FOID. That simple idea blossomed into 242 pages of a potential piece of legislation still sitting in the Rules Committee. No gun legislation is currently moving forward, he said, except a bobcat bill that would allow bobcats to be hunted in counties where they are a problem.

Asked about fraud in programs like welfare and Medicaid, Bennett said he has been told by state departments that the problem is a federal one, while federal representatives say they are state problems. Armed with questions and criticisms of the programs, Bennett said he's going to talk with state officials again and get to the bottom of who is responsible and what can be done.
