## Multi Agency plans program to fill void left by funding cuts

In April of this year, Gov. Bruce Rauner suspended \$26 million in grants for human service and public health projects.

A local program affected by the cut was Hoopeston Multi Agency's Teen REACH (Responsibility, Education, Achievement, Caring and Hope).

Teen REACH was unceremoniously dumped before the end of last school year, but the agency's board of directors approved funding the program through the end of the year.

With a new school year fast approaching HMA executive director Marie Sermersheim hopes to fill the void left by that program with a homegrown replacement.

school, August 24, Sermersheim said.

The program will run from 3-6:30 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays and unlike Teen REACH, which served young people ages eight to 17, the Multi Agency program will be for students in kindergarten through age 17.

Alicia Zarate will be the director of the program which will offer a safe place to be, homework help, a meal and fun.

Teen REACH was funded by government and foundation money. Sermersheim said. The program had re-


ceived \$48,000 from the state. Three years ago, the amount was cut to \$33,000 before April's cut, she said.

That money was used for 72 voungsters registered for the program, which had an average of 34 attendees daily.

On paper, the new program has a budget of \$81,000 and includes items like rent and utilities.

However, in actual numbers, Sermersheim said it will need \$62,000 to provide staff and training, meals and activities.

A little of that can be shaved off the cost of meals thanks to the garden planted by students participating in a summer program di-Photo contributed rected by East Central Illinois dens. The vegetables and herbs from the garden will be canned and used for meals at the program



over the winter months, Sermersheim said.

Of the \$62,000, Sermersheim said the program currently has \$652 in the bank, raised by volunteers at the July 3 celebration and the Lorraine Street Party, from face painting and the sale of Sermersheim's homemade salsa.

While hoping Hoopeston will get behind the project, Sermersheim is willing to give, too. Along with making salsa, she also makes jewelry and said 100 percent of sales of both to people in this area will be donated to the after

"I think it's up to the community to keep this program going," Sermersheim said. "We can't depend on the federal government. That's what got us into this.'
