Service members who gave all remembered on Memorial Day

May 24 marked the 11th anniversary of the death of PFC Jeffrey "Jeffro" Wallace, of Hoopeston. PFC Wallace, 20, died in Baghdad, Iraq when an improvised explosive device exploded near his Humvee.

Last weekend, the 11th annual Jeffro Jam was held - a two-night party dedicated to PFC Wallace and a way to raise funds for a memorial scholarship that honors him. On Monday, some of those who partied hard over the

weekend - and scores of others - gathered at Floral Hill Cemetery to remember PFC Wallace, along with other Hoopeston men who gave their lives in service to America.

In his keynote address, Bruce McQuigg, who served as a Marine and is now pastor of New Beginnings Church, said those who have died for their country realize "there was something more important than their physical life."

McQuigg said people ask what those who have died might have accomplished had they lived. "That question is easily answered," he said. "They have answered the highest calling possible. They have offered their lives for each of us that stand here in the light of freedom this day. Of this one thing we can be certain: there is hno higher calling than the cause of a free nation; there is no vainglory in it, there is nothing more valuable or more precious than having paid the ultimate price for liberty." McOuigg read from Ecclesiastes 3:1-8:

There is an appointed time for everything. And there is a time for every purpose under heaven-

A time to give birth and a time to die;

A time to plant and a time to uproot what is planted. A time to kill and a time to heal;

A time to tear down and a time to build up.

"It's always the right time for peace, he said. In closing, McQuigg quoted Gen. George Patton: "it is foolish and wrong to mourn the men who died. Rather we should thank God that such men lived."

Further music was provided by the Hoopeston Area High School band and chorus.

The Rev. Tom Cici, newly-named pastor of Hoopeston First Christian Church, gave the invocation and benediction.

Mayor Bill Crusinberry served as master of ceremonies for the service, welcoming guests and thanking those who participated, including Hoopeston American Legion and VFW's joint color guard and honor guard, and the service members who attended the ceremony.

Crusinberry also noted the Hoopeston Historical Society and the Barbara Standish chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution who gave special honor to Vietnam era veterans inside the cemetery chapel.

The service was followed by a free lunch at the VFW post.
