Eclectic acts, old favorites, newcomers all part of 74th annual Sweetcorn Festival

As chairman of this year's National Sweetcorn Festival, like his predecessors, PJ Clingenpeel got to pick the theme of the event, *Shucking Open a New Door*, and the logo for the event, homage to the Cubs' 2016 World Series championship.

There's one more thing he'd like to rename: the activities at center stage during this year's festival.

"I want to rename it "Callie's Eclectic Collection," Clingenpeel said, chuckling about what fellow Jaycee Callie Lankford has in store. "There's all kinds of random stuff going on over there," he added.

New center stage acts begin Saturday with Julia Silver singing at 12:45, followed at 1:30 by Drums Alive. Registration will be at 2 p.m., for a joke-telling contest that begins at 2:30 in front of Center Stage. At 3:30, Hot Iron Sting Band will perform.

On Sunday, Lankford's selections include a Mr. Legs contest (registration at 12:30 p.m., contest at 1 p.m.), Hoopeston Area vocal ensemble at 1:30 p.m. and Doc Ashton and the Root Canals at 3 p.m.

The 80s will make a comeback at the noon Pigtail, Ponytail, Braid, Mullet and Mohawk contest (registration at 11:30 a.m.), followed at 12:30 by music by Willis Monroe Clayton. Rounding out the day are a kids pie eating contest (registration at 1 p.m., eating at 1:30 p.m.) and Alex Jenkins and the Bomber music at 2 p.m.

The big entertainment draw this year is Saturday's Jo Dee Messina concert. Messina is scheduled to perform at 7:30 p.m. Tickets are \$25.

Helicopter rides are a last-minute addition to this year's activities, Clingenpeel said. Rides will be given during daylight hours, roughly from noon-6 p.m., in the northeast corner of the park annex. A not-quite five minute ride will be \$20.

Fun family entertainment is scheduled for the local crowd that attends Thursday and Friday. A kiddy tractor pull is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. Thursday (registration starts at 5 p.m.) and the midway will feature a bracelet night ride special.

Bracelet specials will be held daily throughout the festival. Bracelets are \$20 each day.

The Jaycees hired a different rodeo company this year and moved the event to Friday at 7:30 p.m. in the annex.

Also on Friday, Rockin' Roy DJ will be in the beer garden from 10 p.m.-1 a.m., and for those who like to sing, a karaoke contest ill begin at 11 p.m.

Another local, Nick Gonzalez, will be featured in Sun-



day entertainment when the band, Hurricane Creek, plays in the beer garden at 9 p.m.

This will be the second year of the new National Sweetheart Pageant, which does not feature runners-up from state pageants. Twenty-four girls are in this year's crop of beauties, Clingenpeel said, adding that since only one girl is chosen from each state, some girls had to be turned away as five or six had multiple applications.

This year's Saturday car show will use a different format than has been used and will be run by the Milford Car Club. Proceeds from the show will be donated to The Harbor, a teen youth center, he said.

On Sunday, the Jaycees will pay tribute to the man who was last year's grand marshal of the Grand Parade.

Mark Drollinger, Hoopeston's police chief, who died of oral cancer on July 6, will be honored with a Salute to the Chief at 2:30 p.m. State Rep. Tom Bennett is expected to attend, joined by other dignitaries.

Admission to McFerren Park has not been raised in several years and remains at \$3 per person. Children seven and younger are admitted free.

The fee is a sticking point for some residents, but Clingenpeel said it helps the Jaycees fund many of their annual programs, like Underprivileged Children's Christmas, post-prom activities and the annual Easter egg hunt.

An added bonus, the Jaycees "share the wealth" with organizations that man the gates, giving them a percentage of the gate fee to use for their own programs.

This year's main gatekeepers will be the Star Lodge, Clingenpeel said. The Masonic lodge has taken on the task of finding other organizations to help man the gates during the festival.

Speaking of gates, the Jaycees have had large maps printed of the park that show the areas where activities
