tury Christians, Desert Fathers, John of the Cross, Teresa of Avila, Francis of Assisi and many others have learned and used the practice of contemplative prayer. The practice died out completely during the Age of Enlightenment, but has slowly become popular again.

Practitioners of contemplative prayer claim it is a great stress and anxiety reducer. Harmony in one's life becomes more important than physical balance, as important as that is. The prayer helps you feel good about yourself. For these reasons, contemplative prayer shares some practice to meditation.
