# Council hears need for TIF extension in wake of development

City officials hope representatives of taxing bodies will approve an extension to Hoopeston's tax increment financing (TIF) districts.

A meeting of those representatives is set for 9:30 a.m. January 31 at Hoopeston

City Hall.

Ald. Bill Goodwine, finance committee chairman, announced the TIF meeting at a special city council meeting Tuesday.

Planned development in Hoopeston - including a new First Farmers Bank and Trust facility, restaurant and truck stop/truck wash all at the intersection of Rtes. 1 and 9, plus a hotel and restaurant on property between Hoopeston Marathon and Hoopeston Chrysler will be aided by extending TIF, which rebates some eligible costs.

With TIF, the difference between the taxes of an undeveloped property (the base) and taxes when the property is developed is called the increment. TIF allows municipalities to enter agreements with developers, rebating a portion of eligible costs to the developer for a specified number of years. TIF's purpose is to spur economic growth in undeveloped areas.

For example, the former Baer property has generated no property taxes since Hoopeston took it over in 2005. With a bid accepted to sell the property to Hoopeston Retirement Village Foundation, and the foundation's an agreement with First Farmers Bank and Trust, the land will be put back tax rolls and will generate an increment for Hoopeston's TIF fund.

## Hotel agrees to franchise, other development revealed

A national hotel chain has agreed to sell a franchise to allow a hotel to be built in Hoopeston.

Cobblestone Hotels has agreed to sell a franchise to a group of private investors who are currently doing due diligence on the project, Harry Brockus said on Tuesday.

Brockus, CEO of Carle Hoopeston Regional Health Center, is also a member of Hoopeston Retirement Village Foundation, which is working to increase economic growth in Hoopeston.

Cobblestone builds hotels in mostly smaller, rural communities. It opened one in Paxton last vear and has others in Altamont and Newton.

Additionally, Brockus announced that the foundation has purchased the Dick Jones property, with plans for a truck stop/truck wash. Two companies have expressed interest in the project, Brockus said, but neither has committed yet.

Work on the truck stop could begin in fall this vear while signs of a hotel won't be visible until 2019, he said.

The foundation has previously purchased former Baer land on Rt. 1 and is working with First Farmers Bank and Trust, which plans to consolidate its services into a new facility at that location.

Restaurants are being planned for all three locations.

to take effect.

At a finance committee meeting last Thursday, Goodwine reviewed existing TIF redevelopment agreements, which include CVS, which receives \$27,000 per year and Autumn Fields, \$29,000.

The TIF fund also pays for TIF administration by Champaign lawyer Kenneth Beth; \$12,000 for a shared resource person, \$10,000 for the city façade program; \$10,000 for city administration of TIF and \$10,000 for miscellaneous expenses.

Additionally, Hoopeston earmarks about \$50,000 each year for large projects at Hoopeston Area schools. Almost from Hoopeston TIFs' inception, Goodwine has championed giving money to the schools because under TIF, they lose the most money of all the taxing bodies. Previously, money has been used to pay for roofing, access doors and other work. Currently, city funds are going to the all-weather track project at Hoopeston Area High School.

In other business, Mayor Bill Crusinberry said after the meeting that the applications for chief of police have been narrowed to about eight, with additional research being done on the resumes.

At the January 16 meeting, which failed to field a quorum for taking action, Ald. Brandon Hamilton reported that a couple of interviews had been held prior to that meeting. He was absent from Tuesday's special meeting.
