# Planned sanitary sewer work likely to increase some flooding

A plan to line Hoopeston's sanitary sewers and seal sewer joints will not help alleviate flooding in Hoopeston's northeast side and may, in fact, make it worse in some places.

Ald. Alex Houmes said he was contacted by a resident who lives south of Cheese (North Side) Park about flooding and what is being done about it. Houmes requested answers to pass on to the resident. "Even if they don't like the answer, I want to give them an answer," he said. Engineer Sam Cole of C2 Engineering did not have good news, saying "the concept will actually increase the frequency of flooding at that location."

Mayor Bill Crusinberry said "we're just in a low spot and there are just no good answers" to the flooding problem. Crusinberry said to remedy flooding, the problem needs to be addressed further east where the water comes into the city.

Cole said that while the area is not in a flood plain, which would require rivers or other bodies of water, it is in a low area. Additionally, there are barriers to water leaving the area, such as Market St., which was raised when it was resurfaced and helps hold back water. Removing all of the barriers associated with the flooding would be very expensive, he added.

Asked by Houmes if there is anything the residents can do, Cole said the only option is to raise the elevation of their house.

Returning to the sanitary sewer project, Crusinberry said it won't help drain storm water because the sanitary system will be sealed and storm water will be on top of the ground.

Houmes asked if he should report that the problem will never be fixed. "I wouldn't say 'never'," Crusinberry said, "but I'd sav it's not feasible in the near future."

The next phase of work is expected to take on the city's storm sewers, he added.

Addressing another city problem - that of dilapidated buildings - Leon Polson, owner of Polson Insurance, 218 E. Main St., asked when the city plans to do something

about the vacant, dilapidated building at 220 E. Main. "I don't know how to get to #1 on the list," said Polson, who said he has asked for remedy on the adjacent building for five to seven years. "What are you going to do See FLOODING on other side


Mrs. Burton thought of and treated all under her direction as family using the many wonderful leadership qualities we all should try to emulate.
