


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A new school could attract residents to Hoopeston and be part of an economic improvement plan for the city, according to Hoopeston Area's auditor.

An informational meeting about the proposed one percent County Schools Facility Tax drew about 30 people to the Hoopeston American Legion Wednesday evening.

If approved, money from the tax could be used only for capital expenses, said accountant Russ Leigh, auditor of Hoopeston Area's finances. Uses include improving technology, upgrading building safety, repairs and renovations, and construction of a new school.

Speaking for himself, and not as a district spokesman, Leigh said he's in favor of building a new school on the 6.55 acres the district purchased last year for \$112,000.

Leigh said Milford's new school has been an incentive for 25 new residents to move to the community and expects the same could happen in Hoopeston. "Why fix the old buildings, let's just go for a new one," he said. Sales tax money could pay for the new building, which would be a benefit to everybody. "That's something somebody needs to think about down the road."

Supt. Suzzette Hesser said officials will look at the cost of a new school compared to renovating existing buildings and will seek community input.

big-ticket wish list, including new boilers for Maple and removing asbestos ceiling tiles.

Residents Terry Buhrmester and Stan Steiner - who attended a meeting Tuesday between some Hoopeston aldermen and Harry Brockus, representing Hoopeston Retirement Village Foundation - questioned going into debt when Brockus said the city will never have a major factory or other large employer.

Eighner chided that thinking. "As long as that school of thought goes, (the community) won't grow," he said. Using officials' selling point that one percent is not

Sales tax money may also be used to lower property taxes but Leigh advises against that because it is likely that at least some part of pensions will be shifted to local districts. If a property tax freeze is also implemented, districts will have to find ways to pay the increased pension load.

If approved, the tax would add one percent to the cost of things like restaurant meals, gasoline and household purchases, Leigh said. Groceries, medicine, cars, trucks, and farm equipment and supplies are excluded.

If enacted, tax money would be divided among Vermilion County schools on a per-pupil basis. Officials estimate Hoopeston Area could receive \$436,000 annually from the tax, if enacted.
