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Superintendent reviews security measures for student safety

Key changes to improve student safety were implemented in Hoopeston Area schools during the last school year, Supt. Suzzette Hesser reported at Thursday's district board meeting.

First, all staff were trained in Youth Mental Health First Aid and trauma-informed practices. "We know that strong, caring, trauma-informed relationships with our students and their families are central to a positive school climate and school safety," Hesser said in her monthly report.

This study will continue in the new school year with online trauma-informed academy modules, followed in 2019-20 by a district-wide book study of the same author, she said.

Another step started with sending five faculty members to become certified ALICE (Alert Lockdown Inform Counter Evacuate) training. In turn, those staff and Hoopeston Police Department trained all district staff. Hoopeston Area is now an ALICE-certified organization and will continue regular training.

The district crisis plan was also revised, to combine each school's plan into one district crisis plan that is in line with model plans around the state. Before the plan was finalized, district personnel sought feedback from area first responders and implemented suggestions, including to update handheld radios so administrators and key staff may communicate within buildings and

Health officials refute bacterial meningitis reports in county

DANVILLE - The Vermilion County Health Department and local hospitals are collaborating to alleviate public concern after receiving several unsubstantiated reports of bacterial meningitis in the county.

"Currently we are aware of two patients from Vermilion County who are being treated for viral meningitis, and two other suspected, who are awaiting confirmation from the lab," said Douglas Toole, department Public Health Administrator.

Viral meningitis is generally more common but not as serious as bacterial meningitis. People with viral meningitis appear acutely ill and are uncomfortable - commonly experiencing headaches, stiff necks and low-grade fever -- but most people recover within a few days.

Viral meningitis is one of most common types of meningitis. Any age can be affected by it, but young children and those with compromised immune systems are the most susceptible. While it is important to seek medical care when experiencing fever, headache and a stiff neck, patients usually gets better on their own with rest and hydration.

Toole said health officials are not aware of any cases of

the more serious, contagious strains of bacterial meningitis - such as Neisseria mengitidis - in Vermilion County.

Those strains of bacterial meningitis can initially involve the same symptoms as viral meningitis, but can progress to include permanent disabilities such as brain damage and hearing loss, and can be life-threatening.

According to the Illinois Department of Public Health, between 10 and 25 cases of meningococcal disease (causes by the bacterium Neisseria meningiditis) are reported in Illinois each year. The last time a Vermilion County patient was reported to have that strain was 2011. Simple precautions can reduce the risk of contracting meningitis.

Toole suggested that the best method of prevention is the meningitis vaccine. Most children receive an initial vaccine at 11, and a booster shot at 16, so check shot records and contact health care providers and health departments with questions about the vaccine.

In addition, people should practice good handwashing, avoid sharing utensils and drinks, cover coughs and sneezes, and stay home when sick to avoid spreading diseases.

throughout the district in case of a crisis.

Finally, she said, Hoopeston Area is adding two apps to enhance security next year. The first is Crisis Go, which provides staff mobile access to the district crisis plan; alert signals in crises; the ability to share information in a crisis; and methods for reporting student attendance in the event of an evacuation.

The second app, Stop It! Is an anonymous reporting system that allows students and families to report safety concerns directly to administration. Completely anonymous, users may attach screenshots, pictures and videos while also having the option for a secure chat with administration, she said.

"At Hoopeston Area, we understand that safety and security is our number one priority," Hesser said. "As we serve our students, families and entire community, we welcome feedback and conversation regarding our ongoing efforts to continually improve safety and security at Hoopeston Area."

Several personnel changes were approved by the board, most in 6-0 votes, with member Chris Small absent. They include:

Hoopeston man sentenced to 20 years for 2016 shooting death

A 33-year-old Hoopeston man was sentenced to 20 years in prison in the 2016 shooting a Danville woman at the Fair Oaks housing complex in Danville.

Johnnie Lee Sampson Jr. was sentenced after pleading guilty to second-degree murder in the August 5, 2016 shooting death of Mary Thompson, 30, of Danville.

Sampson must serve 50 percent of that sentence and 85 percent of a five-year sentence handed down after he pleaded guilty to aggravated discharge of a firearm from the same incident.

Ms. Thompson was shot in the head at about 9:40 p.m. as she drove into Fair Oaks for a visit.

Sampson was arrested August 15, 2016 at his home in the 1200 block of Daisy Lane, originally charged with four counts of first-degree murder. He was held on \$1 million in the woman's death and will receive credit for time served in the county jail.

Sampson was set to face a jury on June 18 prior to pleading guilty to the charges.
