Orange frog helps school district staff find spark of happiness

Hoopeston Area's mascot, the blue Jerky, has temporarilv been replaced by an orange frog.

The frog, named Spark, is a take-way from The Happiness Advantage training some staff attended after Hoopeston Area received a \$95,000 GEAR UP (Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Program) grant from the Illinois Student Assistance Commis-

Ten middle and high school staff and Supt. Suzzette Hesser, attended training June 23-27 at Harvard University Graduate School of Education. A separate grant paid transportation costs, even the shuttle to the airport. "We didn't pay for any of it," Hesser said.

Spark was created by positive psychology practitioner Shawn Achor, author of *The Happiness Advantage* and The Orange Frog.

Spark lived in a pond near three other frogs in their ponds. He was shunned by the other frogs. One frog did nothing but work, another neglected work to play. Spark discovered that as he balanced his life - being thankful, helpful to others, exercising and receiving social support he became more orange and had a happier life. Soon other frogs were seeking him out to help them balance their own lives.

The frog "is a symbol of the mindset we want to be in," Hesser said, calling it "an esprit de corps" in the district. "Happiness is a choice," she added.

Since June, most other staff has been trained in happiness by Emily Brown, the "trained trainer," who held a session earlier this month in which 145 staff were introduced to Spark and happiness.

Happiness training is based on Abraham Maslow's theory of the hierarchy of needs. The theory ranks needs in a pyramid, with physiological needs at the base, including breathing, water, food, sleep, shelter and others. Once those needs are relatively satisfied, the next level is safety needs: personal, emotional and financial security, health and well-being.

The next level is social belonging, including friendships,

intimacy and family, followed by the esteem level - being respected and valued by others.

In 1943, when Maslow introduced his theory, he capped the triangle with self-actualization, a person's ability to reach his full potential. In later years, he added selftranscendence, whereby a self is only actualized by giving, in altruism and spirituality.

The thrust of the training is to increase personal happiness. While that may seem like a goal that has nothing to do with educating students, Hesser would disagree. "We

need to take care of ourselves so we can do what we need to do for the kids," Hesser said.

She compared emotionally drained teachers to an empty well, unable to fill their students. "We fill our own tank so we're emotionally ready to give."

Happiness is just one area of training for Hoopeston Area staff to help meet the social and emotional needs of students. Employees have also been trained in Trauma Informed Practices, by which staff get to the root level of what's going on in a student's life, whether it be the divorce of his parents, the death of a pet or family violence.

Another component is Youth Mental Health First Aid, which aims to train anyone who is in contact with youth ages 12 to 18 who may be experiencing an emotional or addiction issue or is in crisis.

Another tool the district is using is Ripple Effects, described as "personalized technology to help students address non-academic barriers to school success," that targets student discipline.

By considering each student's emotional needs and life situations, Hesser believes Hoopeston Area can help each child not only survive, but thrive by teaching them to learn what they can and can't control and move forward in the direction they want their life to go.

"Education is about people," Hesser said. "We don't educate a desk, we educate the child in the desk. We need to address whatever needs they bring in the door."

Some of those who have been trained had high praise for the effort at Thursday's Hoopeston Area school board meeting. One of those was Dylan Swank, Hoopeston Education Association president. "I've heard nothing but positive comments from staff," he said adding teachers looked forward to being "respected and self-actualized. It's something the HEA could get behind," he said.
