Council unanimously approves measures for Teasdale Foods

In three unanimous votes, Hoopeston City Council approved three resolutions concerning Teasdale Latin Foods.

Teasdale's desire to clean the sediment lagoons, where its wastewater is sent, resulted in two resolutions: one between Hoopeston and Teasdale and the other between Hoopeston and Westville-based ERH Enterprises, a water and wastewater management company.

Teasdale and ERH had already worked out - but not finalized - an agreement when Teasdale executives saw a provision in a 2006 contract between then-Hoopeston Foods and the city which calls for the city to pay for maintenance on the city-owned lagoons before being reimbursed by the company.

The agreement was passed on to Teasdale when they purchased Hoopeston Foods in in 2012.

Ald. Lourdine Florek, water/sewer committee chairman, said the two companies had agreed upon the sum of \$425,000 for the work, which the city would now pay, then receive reimbursement. "Basically, it's flow-through money," she said.

In 7-0 votes, with Ald. Ryan Anderson absent, the council gave Mayor Bill Crusinberry the authority to sign documents with Teasdale Foods and ERH for the project. Under the approval, Hoopeston will pay \$40,000 to ERH to begin cleaning and \$11,000 per month for 35

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months, all of which will be reimbursed, she said.

Sediment in three of the five lagoons will be removed to within one foot of the bottom and will be taken to drying beds at the city's wastewater treatment plant, Crusinberry said.

In other Teasdale-related action, the council approved 7-0, a resolution allowing Crusinberry to sign documents vacating Lincoln St. from First Ave. to the railroad tracks once the issue has been approved by Teasdale officials.

Hoopeston will vacate the street to allow Teasdale to building more loading docks and to improve employee safety. In return, the company is expected to pay the Hoopeston \$5,000 for administrative and legal costs associated with the change and for signage directing trucks to use Second Ave. The company is also to approve installing a sidewalk on West Maple to the tracks and cap an abandoned water main on First Ave. that runs under the tracks.


In other business, the council heard from John Heckler, representing the Vermilion County Land Bank, who presented a \$19,940 check to the city for dump fees for dump fees for dilapidated houses the land bank paid to tear down.

learned much from the experience.

The land bank had expected to pay about \$8,000 to take a house down but ended up spending about \$40,000, in part because one of the houses had asbestos siding. "In the future, we probably won't take a house with asbestos siding," he said.

Two of the properties that were cleaned up have been sold to neighbors, Heckler said.

The land bank currently has \$20,000 and \$30,000 available to tear down more houses in the county. In addition, the group earlier this year received a \$300,000 grant from Illinois Housing Development Authority and is working with them on how the money may be used.

Heckler, who spent 40 years in public administration, said cities taking ownership of property is a new thing.
