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HA board considers costs for heating, cooling upgrades

The proposed cost of improving heating and adding cooling to John Greer and Maple schools have at least a couple Hoopeston Area School Board members considering new construction.

At a special meeting Wednesday, the board met with Stanley Gebben, mechanical engineer with The Upchurch Group of Champaign. Tasked with developing improvement options, taking into consideration existing heating and cooling,

Gebben's cost estimates included replacing existing heating systems in both buildings, at a cost of \$1,350,000 at John Greer and \$1,100,000 at Maple. Electrical upgrades - necessary if all-school cooling is installed - would be \$200,000 for John Greer and \$250,000 at Ma-

Four cooling options were provided for the buildings:

- A ductless min-split system, which would use rooftop and ground units throughout each building. In both, existing heating systems could be used. Corridors and service rooms would not be cooled with this type system, estimated to cost \$700,000 for John Greer and \$550,000 at
- A variable unit ventilator (VUV) system would be installed in classrooms, the cafeteria and offices. One vertical fan coil unit could be put in each space or one to cool multiple spaces. This system is estimated at \$1,650,000 at John Greer and \$1,300,000 at Maple.
- Geothermal system, with a \$2,350,000 price tag, would remove the existing heating system at John Greer and would use a heat pump system using the earth as its heating and cooling source. The system would require a well field, which, for John Greer, would need to cover the entire grass portion of the playground east of the school. After about 200 wells were installed, the area would be graded and seeded.

Geothermal is not an option for Maple due to lack of vard space for a well field.


• A variable air volume (VAV) system, which Gebben called "the Cadillac system in terms of comfort, and probably the most expensive" would put air handling units at various locations in each building. These would provide 55F air to VAV boxes in each zone or room. Equipped with hot water reheat, the boxes would raise the delivery air temperature. The system would require an air-cooled chiller and new boilers and would completely remove the existing HVAC system. Ceiling and lights would have to be removed to install new ductwork. with new lights and lay-in ceiling installed.

Estimates for the VAV system are \$2,900,000 for John Greer and \$2,250,000 for Maple. "It's a massive project to put cooling into an existing building," Gebben said.

Estimates do not include the cost of abating asbestos in ceiling tiles, to which board member Chris Elliott said, "By the time you abate everything, you're looking at \$4 million. "I'm not going to vote for that."

Member Lawrence Jahn was of like mind. "I just can't see spending that kind of money on an old building," he said.

Gebben responded, "we can go ahead and draw you guys a new building."

After the regular meeting, Elliott said he wasn't a definite no on the project.

Currently John Greer, built in 1927, has a cast iron boiler low pressure steam unit, installed in about 1957 with a burner replaced about 30 years ago. Four gas-fired furnaces are in the 1959 annex building. For cooling, two window air conditioners are used for the office and original teachers' lounge and two air handlers used for the new teachers' lounge and computer lab.

The school's two-story addition was built in 1967.

Maple, which was built in 1949, has two additions, from 1967 and 1995. The school uses natural gas-fired steam boilers installed with the 1995 addition. Like John

Greer's it has cast iron boiler, low pressure steam units. Cooling for the cafeteria, multi-purpose room and office area is done by three rooftop units. Three classrooms have window air conditioning units.

In other business, the board:

• Approved leasing a new Bluebird Micro Bird activity bus with a five-year annual payment of \$13,535. The district was offered only \$1,200 on its current white activity bus so business manager Mark Eighner will decide whether to trade it in or not.

"I'd take the \$1,200 and run with it," said board member Craig Lee.

"You know what to do with it, whatever way," Elliott told Eighner.

The lease will be through CSB Financial.

• Following an executive session, the board approved the resignation of Brad Walsh, John Greer head custodian, effective November 5.
