Gathering honors veterans at Red Top Cemetery's first Wreaths Across America service

At 11 a.m. Saturday, a gathering of Hoopeston area residents joined those across the country in a Wreaths Across America ceremony.

For the first time, Red Top Cemetery took part in the program, placing green wreaths on the graves of five veterans.

Deck received another seven wreaths, one decorated for each military branch - Army, Navy, Marines, Coast Guard and Merchant Marines - and one in honor of the 93,129 service members whose last known status was Prisoners of War or Missing in Action. These were attached to the cemetery fence on the west side of Route 1 to catch the attention of passing motorists.

Since the cemetery stone restoration project earlier this year, Wreaths Across America is one way Grant Township Supervisor Megan Deck hopes to draw attention to Red Top.

Although the most recent grave is about a year old, Red Top is comprised of mostly old graves, including a marker for Revolutionary War veteran George Redden. "I'm told that's rare in the state," Deck said.

According to Redden's marker, he lived from 1746-1838 and served with the New York Military. Although he has a memorial at Red Top, his remains are buried in Sterling, Md., according to his marker.

Deck said all it took to become part of the Wreaths

Across America was an email expressing interest. In return, Deck received the wreaths at no cost. "They just sent them to me," she said.

Susie Drollinger read a statement prepared by WAA, which included a moment of silence for those who served and are serving in the military.

Wreaths Across America is a national organization, which began in 1992 when Morrill Worcester, owner of Worcester Wreath Company in Harrington, Maine, used a surplus of wreaths to decorate graves at Arlington National Cemetery. In 2005, photos of the graves circulated on the internet, resulting in national interest and thousands of requests for wreaths for national and state cemeteries.
