# School forum addresses safety, finances, several other topics

A variety of topics was covered in a public forum sponsored by Hoopeston Area School District Wednesday.

The evening began with Hoopeston Police Officer Clayton Cahoe giving an update on school safety. County officers recently held active shooter ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate) training in the district, he said. Training is done in age-appropriate ways for each building to minimize threats and violence. "There's no way to make sure nothing ever happens," he said, adding police are not onsite every day - "generally only when something happens."

Supt. Robert Richardson then took to the podium. "Have you folks ever been to a Gallagher show," he joked, looking at empty seats in the front rows, while the more than 40 attendees gathered in back row seats.

He gave a pared-down presentation on school finances "Because we all have to work tomorrow, we're not going over the full gamut," he said.

Districts get revenue from three main sources: local property taxes, state taxes that are distributed based on an adequacy equation, and federal tax dollars provided as grants and other funding mechanisms. Grants and donations from other sources round out district funding.


Hoopeston Area residents pay approximately Richardson said.

The district budget is divided into nine categories. The education fund, used to pay things directly related to teaching students, is the district's largest fund for income and expenses. Other categories are transportation, operation and maintenance, bond and interest, social security/ Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund, capital improvement, working cash, tort and fire prevention and safety.

# Preliminary approval given for Thompson improvements

Officials have given preliminary approval for the full scope of Hoopeston's plan to repair Thompson Ave.

At last week's Hoopeston City Council meeting, Mayor Bill Crusinberry said preliminary approval was given at a September 12 meeting with Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) and Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) officials.

Pending documentation, Crusinberry said a green light was given to the city's plan to improve Thompson from the CSX tracks to the eastern city limits.

Tracy Fullen, engineer with Donohue & Associates, said previously that work from Market to the city limits was FHWA-eligible but she was unsure the portion from the tracks to Market.

Hoopeston will ask for FHWA funds to cover 80 per-

ways to be involved, from regularly checking the district website for news, volunteering at a school, parents interacting with their children about their school day and activities, and serving on a parent advisory group.

A one percent school facilities sales tax. Voted down in 2018, county superintendents are expected to ask voters to reconsider.

Board president Dave McFadden expects the board to vote in October or November whether it will support a resolution putting the question to voters in the April 2021 election. "My position - and I'm only one of seven - is I intend to support it," he said. For it to be on the ballot, boards representing more than 50 percent of all public students in the county must vote to have the measure on the ballot.

talked about the state teacher shortage and that Illinois is looking at ways to get more people interested in teaching. Locally, Hoopeston is "growing its own" teachers, as former students get a degree and return to teach at their alma mater, he said, calling it an "Out of the box idea to help solve the problem."

Addressing the number after the meeting, Richardson said nine people, all substitutes, are teaching at levels in which they are not certified. These include three serving in unfilled positions, four covering maternity leaves, one as a certified teacher finishes her student teaching and one is substitute who is completing licensing requirements.
