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Council approves new façade committee, building update

Hoopeston residents will be able to have their say when it comes to recreational cannabis in the city.

Mayor Bill Crusinberry set a special city council meeting for 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 29 as a time for residents to share their opinions on how officials should deal with the issue, created when the Illinois legislature legalized

be given a specified amount of time to address the council from the podium. The meeting will be recorded, he added.

After residents have finished speaking, council members will be allowed a brief time to speak.

Some routine business will also be conducted prior to residents speaking. With a three-week gap until the November 5 meeting, "it's a good time to pay our bills while we're here." Crusinberry said.

In other business Tuesday, the council, in a 7-0 vote, approved new members to the city's façade committee.

Members must come from different segments of the community and now include Marta Pierce, as an interested citizen: Ald. Robin Lawson, representing the city; Hoopeston Chamber of Commerce President Valarie Hinkle; Carol Hicks, representing Hoopeston Historical Society; and Emily Brown as a business representative.

to take ownership of the building and tear it down.

"I don't think any of us want to pay to clean these properties up but here we are, stuck with them," Houmes said. In the last couple of years since the city has been demolishing buildings, residents have joined in, taking ownership and tearing down dilapidated homes in their neighborhoods.

Razing the multi-story building will cost significantly more than demolishing a house, leaving the city to pay - a scenario Houmes called "unfortunate, but beneficial for us to continue to budget for these kinds of properties."

In unrelated action:

- Ald. Chad Yaden said bids are still being accepted for fall grave blankets. Specs are available at city hall. Bids will be opened at 10 a.m. Tuesday, Nov. 5 at city hall.
- Crusinberry that Subway has not yet been given the green light to move from its existing location to the former First Farmers Bank building across the street. The lease issue between the local Subway and Hooterville Broadcasting has been resolved. An issue remains between Subway corporate and the local store, he said.
- Ald. Bill Goodwine, member of a three-man committee researching building security, said he contacted engineer Tracy Fullen, of Donohue & Associates, for help in gathering necessary specifications for the project.
- Resident Stan Steiner asked what aldermen think about "our illustrious governor" wanting to merge 650 downstate and suburban police and fire pensions into two plans, one for police and another for fire.

Crusinberry said each community is supposed to have its own line item under the proposal. Ald. Bill Goodwine said a higher interest rate would be available for a combined \$100 million than the city's \$3.2 million.
