## Small sampling of residents against legal cannabis sales in city

Marijuana. Weed. Pot. No matter what you call it, Hoopeston residents aren't high on recreational cannabis being sold in the city.

Roughly 40 people attended a special Hoopeston City Council meeting Tuesday evening to weigh in on whether officials should allow recreational cannabis to be sold here.

At the door, residents who wished to address the issue were asked to sign in. Other sheets were available where people who did not want to speak could sign in for allowing or disallowing sales in Hoopeston.

Of those who did not want to speak, 16 signed in against allowing sales and four in favor. Thirteen people spoke to the council, each given three minutes to give their opinions. Eight spoke against and five in favor.

Pastors of two Hoopeston churches - David Bowen of First Church of God and Adam Taubert of First Baptist both spoke against allowing sales.

"We are not controlling whether or not we're legalizing it but we are controlling how close it is to us," Bowen said, calling marijuana a gateway to drugs such as heroin. He cited statistics for the first four states to legalize marijuana - Colorado, Washington Alaska and Oregon - showing murders and aggravated assaults grew by 38 and 25 percent after legalizing the drug, "a large step above the national average, even taking into consideration population growth.

Taubert said statistics provided by those who wish to sell the drug conflict with those of scientists and doctors. Marijuana, he said, leads to schizophrenia, paranoia and other mental issues and alters brain chemistry, especially in young people. "Their blood is going to be on your hands if you allow this," he said. Taubert explained that the word for "sorcery" in the bible is the same used for "pharmacy." Historically, drugs were used in rituals to create emotional experiences that were "demonic," he said. "If you guys pass this, I fear for the judgment of God upon you," he added.

Speaking in favor of allowing sales, Kellie Ferrell said since marijuana is used as a pain reducer, a means of controlling morning sickness for pregnant women and as a means of easing symptoms of cancer treatment, "I don't see how it can be so bad." She suggested using tax money See CANNABIS on other side

generated from marijuana sales for infrastructure improvements. Also she said, allowing sales isn't going to change how many people use the drug. "People you see on the street probably are not on marijuana. It's probably heroin or meth," she concluded.

David Webber echoed Ferrell, addressing people's concerns, such as teen usage. "It's illegal for teens to use it," he said. In states where pot is legal, usage among youth is down eight percent. It also helps eliminate the black market. "I believe if the city welcomed it, they could keep an eye on it," he said. Although marijuana is still illegal at the federal level, Bernie Sanders plans to use an executive order to make it legal, if he is elected president, Webber said.

The council will make a decision at a future meeting. Recreational cannabis will become legal in Illinois on January 1, 2020. The state will limit the number of licensed facilities that sell legal cannabis. Hoopeston is not expected to receive a license in the initial offering.
