Blended learning reviewed, Walder urges in-person learning

At the first board of education meeting since the new school year got in to full swing, Hoopeston Area administrators on Thursday discussed how teachers, students and parents are adjusting to school in the age of the novel coronavirus.

Calling 2020 a "year to remember forever and hope it never happens again," Supt. Robert Richardson said all segments involved in educating children have been shown flexibility and are stepping up to do what needs to be done - especially students.

Richardson said early on, concerns were expressed about how younger students would deal with having to wear masks. "Occasionally, you'll hear someone say, 'Your mask needs to be over your nose," he said, adding overall, students are coping well. "I'm proud of our kids

for doing what needs to be done," he said.

Principal Suzi Root said Maple School staff and students "are thrilled to be back." Because of COVID-19 restrictions, the district's youngest students eat lunch at their desks. The upsides of that have staff thinking the cafeteria may not need to be used again. The downside is that students spend more time sitting. "Five-year-olds don't sit very much," she said, adding teachers have become creative in having children move while still observing social distancing. "They've been phenomenal," she said.

Curriculum Director Emily Brown talked about some glitches in the remote learning process but said she is "still confident in our remote program and if we have to

go full remote, we have everything in place."

Remote learning is directed at middle and high school students, who have in-person learning Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, while Wednesday is an all-remote learning day. Additionally, since their school day is four hours long, students are expected to do an hour each day of independent study, which includes remote learning lessons.

Families of students in all buildings were also allowed to choose all-remote learning for their students.

Dan Walder, John Greer principal, took a different tack with his report, compiling data on how remote learners fared during the first two weeks of school.

Walder is tracking the school's 65 remote learnings in areas of work completion, Google meetings and assessment completion for English, math and science.

In English, work completion percentages are 68, 64, and 82, for grades three, four, and five, respectively. In Google Meetings, which is how students and teachers communicate in the remote program, the percentages are 50, 72 and 62. Assessment comple-

tion rates were 59, 88 and 78, by grade.

In math and science, completion rates were 85, 45 and 77, Google Meetings 32, 62 and 69, and assessment completion, 50, 95 and 92.

To be successful remote learners, Walder said students need four things: parents who care, some organizational skills, some technical skills and some self-motivation.

Teachers send reminders to students to complete their work and families were made aware of expectations upfront, but some students are falling behind. Walder has made home visits but does not know if that will help.

"For most kids - not all kids - if you don't do the work, you won't do well on the assessment," he said. Some parents will be receiving letters telling them that based on work so far, retention may be a likely outcome.

The solution? "Return remote learners to in-person learning as soon as possible," he said. "In person learning helps the students, the family, the community and society, in the long run."

For those concerned about the safety of returning to full time in-person learning, Walder said, "With the safety measures Hoopeston Area Schools are taking, our students are as safe as they can be in a public place. With mask wearing, social distancing protocols as possible, and daily sanitization, Hoopeston Schools have placed student/staff safety as a top priority. From the inside, what's being done in all our buildings, at this time, I am very comfortable with my own children attending our public schools."

Another area of concern for some remote learners is the lack of access to their mentors.

Whitley Klaber, curriculum secretary, discussed the district's mentoring program, which pairs students with adults from the district and the community

Students are referred to the program by a parent, teacher or administrator. Last year, 26 students were paired: three at Maple, seven at John Greer, 11 at HAMS and five at HAHS. Mentors included 19 community members and seven staff members, who met with mentees weekly for 40 minutes, usually during lunch.

difficult, especially at the middle/high school. While meetings during school would be best, student transportation might be required for after-school meetings, and with COVID-19, "it gets complicated when you bring in mentors from the outside," said high school Principal John Klaber.

While during school hours would be best, continuing the program may depend on using time after school for remote get-togethers between mentors and mentees.

Transportation was problematic at the start of the year, Richardson said. "We had some difficulty mov-

ing kids from Point A to Point B," he said. "Principals were very honest and said, 'No, that's not working." Changes were made and now things are running smoothly. "Our people are really stepping up. I appreciate that," he said.
