Dennis Noyes sets debut novel in fictionalized Hoopeston

Former Hoopeston resident who has written extensively about motorcycle racing has turned his attention to fiction writing, using a town remarkably like Hoopeston as its setting.

Yonders, Illinois, Dennis Noyes' first novel, was released in November. Noves, who lived in Spain and now is in California, debuted the book at Boxcar Books & Vinvl in downtown Hoopeston November 15, meeting first with local media, followed by a chat session with friends and former classmates.

The story begins in 1959, when the perpetrator of a triple homicide escapes the consequences of his actions, only to return in 1998. Buster Lawson, a rookie cop when the murders occurred and now police chief, looks to right the wrong committed years before.

Noves juggled seven voices - male and female - with an equal number of perspectives, a process he said was "difficult. I took a big challenge because I write the point of view from each of those seven characters," he said. "The eighth voice is the narrator and that's not me, that's Hoopeston, That's Yonders."

Noves' character used the language of the day. A selfdescribed Northsider, "the language I use is language that everyone would have been comfortable with back in the day on the north side."

The book is set in the fictitious town of Yonders, but readers will recognize pictures on the front and back covers as shots of Hoopeston's downtown, looking westward on Main St. from Third St. The back cover photo is a shot from the south side of the street, and includes in several buildings currently being demolished as well as the city's water tower, emblazoned with YONDERS.

Vermilion County was renamed Marigold County. County Line Road between Vermilion and Iroquois counties was christened "00" and other familiar Hoopeston streets were renamed for the novel. Hoopeston became Yonders.

There are few indicators in the book linking it to Hoopeston. One of the few nods to its real location is tied to his grandmother. When Noyes is in Hoopeston, he visits her at Floral Hill Cemetery. "I couldn't change the name of the cemetery," he said.

Noyes said he got police procedure tips from a couple of local law enforcement personnel. "Chief Mark Drollinger was very helpful," Noyes said, "and maybe a couple of stories I got from Rodney Kaag."

Asked where the name, Yonders" came from, Noyes said it came from the connection between Kentucky and Hoopeston and how Kentuckians, when planning a trip



north, referred to it as "going up yon-der."

A member of Hoopeston High School's class of 1961, Noyes returned to the classroom while in Hoopeston for his book, speaking with students about his life and writing career.

After graduating high school, Noyes attended the University of Illinois and was "promptly kicked out." He then attended Monmouth College and graduated in 1966.

While at Monmouth, a short story he wrote won the Atlantic Monthly Creative Writing for Students. He attended a writers' conference at Middlebury, Vt., where he met William Styron, an up-and-coming young novelist who was working on his classic, *The Confessions of Nat Turner*. "He told me don't write a novel until you have more life experience," Noyes said. It was advice he heeded.

After college, Noyes began writing short stories for magazines. He traveled to Venezuela, where he found himself with no money. He located the English language Caracas Daily Journal. "The last thing they said to me was 'I wish we could use you but we can't." He was eventually hired to do society page work for a different publication.

He went to Spain, planning to teach for a year or so and start his novel, but instead, he traded in his interest for modified stock car racing at Vermilion County Speedway and instead became a professional motorcycle racer for 17 years. He then was a Grand Prix journalist and Spanish-language TV commentator for Spanish networks.

Noyes has published four books in Europe - two in Spanish and two in English - both dealing with Grand Prix motorcycle racing. They include *Motocourse: 50 Years of Moto Grand Prix:*

The Official History of the Fim Road Racing World Championship Grand Prix which was released in January 1999 and Cinta Americana, a collection of 30 years of Spanish motorcycle columns, released in 2017.

Yonders, Illinois was published by Trébol Editions in Spain and printed in Serbia. A long shipping delay during the Christmas season make the book more difficult to find but Noyes announced recently that nine boxes of books arrived, with one box going to Boxcar Books and Vinyl in Hoopeston.
