For those who have asked, "When are

vou going to write a column? You haven't written a column in forever," today is your lucky day. Starting next week, Just the Facts will

stop being a daily paper and switch to Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. I could say I'm making the change

because I'm getting older. That is certainly true. I'll be another year older next month and while I still have get up and go, both the getting up and the going are a bit slower than they used to be.

I could say there are other things I want to do, and that, too, is true. I've been trying to find time for two years now to knit a sweater. That will be an undertaking for me because, generally speaking, I don't knit. Oh, I knitted a dishcloth and a shawl, but those weren't as advanced as a sweater. Eventually, I hope to try my hand at knitting socks. Someday, I might get adventurous and wander into the world of cable stitches, or I might dive in to all the other projects I've been putting off until "someday."

But the reality is that the decision is a financial one. In the last few years, costs have gone up, as they have for all businesses. The increase in the cost of legal paper alone is crazy and it's become harder to find. The cost of living and the cost of doing business keeps going up and up. The only thing that hasn't gone up the last few years is the cost of advertising in Just the Facts.

When I started Just the Facts, I wanted it to be a way for small businesses to advertise affordably. Many local businesses couldn't afford the rates charged by the chainowned papers. In Just the Facts, the business card size ad started at \$10 in 1993 and has gone up only \$5 over the course of 30 years.

Many things have changed over the last 30 years, but two things have had an enormous impact on all businesses, but especially small ones, and especially those who depend on ad revenue to survive.

First, the economy slumped in the early 2000s. Some



businesses went out of business and many of those that remained open cut their advertising. This downturn the last two years hasn't helped.

The second change is more and more businesses started using the "free" advertising on Facebook. But what are they getting for free?

Their sales are seen by some of potential customers, but certainly not all. Facebook has throttled exposure for those free ads, so fewer people see them. Then, too, not all potential customers "like" or

Also, there is a small but growing number of people, including here in Hoopeston, who do not shop at businesses that advertise solely on Facebook, because they see that Facebook is not going to support your sports league, won't donate to your animal shelter, won't do the feature story on the resident that just did something awesome, or any of the myriad things hometown media does.

Eventually, neither will the hometown media because they will have gone out of business.

I've always been a big proponent of supporting Hoopeston businesses, even if they didn't do business with Just the Facts. For example, although they don't advertise anymore, I do 99.9% of my grocery shopping at IGA...er...Kirby Foods. Why? Because they employ local people and 100 percent of the 1% food sales tax they collect comes right back to Hoopeston to provide city services we expect.

Yes, their prices are often higher than larger chains, but if we lose our grocery store and have to drive to out of town, those out-of-town groceries won't be so cheap anymore.
