Dovle presents proposal for developing newly-cleared area

A long-time resident is asking Hoopeston City Council to consider developing recently-cleared downtown property into an area for residents to get together and enjoy

Dick Doyle's proposal would use much of the 200 block of East Main into an area where Hoopeston residents - as

well as those from neighboring communities - could get together to listen to music, play games, dine from food trucks and garner a sense of community.

His proposal is based on the revitalization of East Liverpool, Ohio, where his daughter, Kim Doyle Smith, and her

family, live. "East Liverpool is one example of a small town doing something that I found intriguing," Doyle said. "I would like us to consider doing something similar here.

"From April through September on the first Friday of every month- but I think we should do it on a Saturday here - the town blocks off the main street to car traffic and throws a citywide block party. The local businesses stay open late, they string Italian lights around the block and put up a portable stage where local musicians perform. They bring in vendors and food trucks. They serve barbecue, beer, pizza, tacos, and funnel cakes. They have games for the kids; the youth organizations and the sports teams set up tables to raise funds' there's even dancing. But most importantly, it's a time when neighbors can put down their smartphones and visit with one another face to face."

Ohio is not the only place where Doyle, and his wife, Pat, saw such community togetherness. "Just about every small town and big city I saw in Italy has what is known as a piazza, whether grand and ornate like Rome's expansive Piazza Navona or just an intimate village square with a few café tables and a bocce ball court. These open gathering spaces are the heart of every community throughout Italy. I'm suggesting we consider turning this property into a similar type of space."

Doyle presented a preliminary design that would include a portable stage on the northwest corner of the area, fronted by a dance floor surrounded by bistro tables. Those could be used for block parties, rallies, outdoor church services, dance recitals and many other activities, he said. The stage and café tables could be "hauled off to make room for farmers markets, swap meets, craft shows and so on."

On the west side, he envisions a restroom facility and on the east, an open-sided party pavilion and picnic tables. A splash pad could grace the center of the area, allowing parents to keep an eye on their children while enjoying a game of corn hole, shuffleboard, bocce ball and Pickleball.

A horseshoe pit and secure storage area would be at the far end of the property. While the storage area would have security lighting, during evening events, the entire area would be lit by strings of Italian lights "for a pleasant and warm glow" Doyle said.

The area could also be used for other things, like car shows, Octoberfest activities, and Halloween trunk or treat. "There are already plans to coordinate with the Lorraine Theatre for events tied with any particular movie they are showing and maybe the space could occasionally be rented out for personal use such as family reunions or outdoor wedding receptions thereby generating self-

supporting funds.

"And with a little bit of clever engineering I believe we could remove the picnic tables and turn that northeast corner into an ice skating rink in the winter months suitable to teach them to ice skate and bring parents downtown. There's also plenty of space for Santa and his elves at Christmas time in addition to fostering stronger friendships between neighbors. Events held in this communal space would draw folks from nearby communities and help boost Hoopeston and area commerce."

To get the idea off the ground, city officials, partnering with Visit Downtown Hoopeston Inc., and the Lorraine Foundation could apply for revitalization grants, he said. "With a dedicated and enthusiastic effort, we could see an amazing change in the next several years and the continuing development and growth of our downtown thereafter.

Doyle said using the East Liverpool program as a guide should work. "Demographically and socio-economically, East Liverpool is very similar to Hoopeston and is experiencing many of the same challenges we are," he said.

According to 2020 census information, East Liverpool, had a population of 9,958, down from 26,000 in the 1960s. The median household income in 2018-2022 was

\$34,560 in 2022 dollars and the percentage of those in poverty was 31.6%, based on the 2022 American Community Survey five-year average.

In 2020, Hoopeston's population was 4,812 and the median household income was \$46,529 (+/- \$8,357). The city's poverty rate was 21.7% (+/- 7.9%).

"You know, when Pat and I first moved to Hoopeston 55 years ago, it was a happening place," Doyle said. "I want it to be a happening place again."
